

# **PROJECT SUMMARY**

The Strengthening Institutional and Economic Resilience in Yemen (SIERY) project aims to bolster the resilience of local governance systems in Taiz, Lahj, and Aden governorates. It will achieve this by enhancing the economic and social well-being of Yemenis, particularly the most vulnerable, through strengthened local governance and economic development. The 10-month project will focus on improving the capacities of public service providers to better reach vulnerable populations in specific districts across the three governorates, concentrating on infrastructure rehabilitation (roads, electricity, sanitation), and equipping schools and hospitals. The project includes assessment, specification development, and implementation phases.

SIERY Project will achieve its goal through its primary objective of enhancing economic and social wellbeing for Yemeni, in particular for the poorest and most vulnerable, through strengthening local governance and local economic development

#### PROJECT SUMMARY

The project's WASH interventions and activities for eleven months are designed and tailored to be in line with the 2022 3rd YHF Reserve Allocation CCCM sector objective of "To ensure continuity of WASH services and mitigate/address potential protection risks of the most vulnerable people in targeted locations through integrated response of comprehensive WASH services, ensuring WASH activities are according to the assessed need and to ensure durability," as well as the WASH cluster strategic objective to deliver life-saving WASH assistance and restore inclusive WASH systems in high-risk areas, and aligned with 2023 HNO and 2022 HRP objectives.

The project's WASH sector activities include the following:

Repair, rehabilitate, augment, or maintain water supply and sanitation systems:

• Rehabilitation of 4 water schemes/wells in Al Wazi'iyah and Mawza districts.

Provide gender-appropriate latrine facilities:

• Construction of 200 family latrines in Al Wazi'iyah district and installing 62 emergency latrines in Mawza district.

Distribution of support for basic hygiene kits and water filters:

• Distribution of basic hygiene kits, sanitation kits, and water filters to the vulnerable targeted populations in Al Wazi'iyah and Mawza districts.

Provide support for solid waste management:

• Provision of solid waste management in Mawza district.

Hygiene Promotion:

• Conducting door-to-door hygiene promotion awareness sessions for the targeted vulnerable beneficiaries in Al Wazi'iyah and Mawza districts.

#### **PROJECT OUTPUTS**

- -Doing maintenance and installation for fourteen fire extinguishers in the three targeted IDP sites.
- -Installing 2 water tanks to fight fire in two IDP sites Al Buhairi and Jasr Resian, and filling them with water to reduce fire risk.
- -Distributing and installing 53 fire extinguishing balls (1.47 kg each) for all IDP families in Al-Mulwa site (53 HHs) to help in case of emergencies. Three IDP sites have community committees of 18 members (12 men and 6 women), divided into six sectors (Shelter, Food, WASH, Education, Health & Nutrition, Protection), each with specific responsibilities. They were trained on site self-management, GBV, CFM, and coordination with NGOs and stakeholders. Committee members held monthly meetings to raise IDP needs to the SMC team for coordination with partners.

#### PROJECT OBJECTIVES

To ensure continuity of service coordination, improved quality of monitoring, and accountability to 280 IDP households in three hosting sites (Buhairi, Al Mulwa, Jasr Resian) in Mawza district, while assessing and supporting pathways to durable solutions for six months. The project also aims to ensure continuity of WASH services and address protection risks for 4,661 HHs (including 345 IDP HHs) in Al-Wazi'iyah and Mawza districts, Taiz Governorate, through improving/rehabilitating water systems, constructing family latrines, distributing hygiene and sanitation kits, conducting hygiene promotion sessions, and solid waste management over eleven months.







The project enhanced flood preparedness and reduced disaster impacts in seven districts of Taiz Governorate through WASH, Shelter/NFI, and CCCM interventions, benefiting over 154,880 individuals in eight districts.

#### **WASH Interventions:**

- Served 9,305 IDP and 10,708 host community households (totaling 139,579 people) in 8 districts.
- Restored safe water for 5,877 people in Al-Madhaf and protected water infrastructure for 8,852 in Al Suwaiqa (Al-Shamaytain).
- Improved hygiene for 31,201 individuals via 123 awareness sessions, 1,250 IEC materials, and 67 clean-up campaigns in 16 IDP sites.
- Removed 1,327m³ of waste from flood canals, reducing risks for 62,000 people in Al-Mudhaffar and Salah.
- Improved sanitation for 4,186 households by removing  $1,133m^3$  of sludge from 916 latrines and maintaining 30 emergency latrines.
- Distributed hygiene kits to 522 households (benefiting 3,149 individuals) in Al-Misrakh, Maqbana, and Al-Mukha.

#### **CCCM Interventions:**

- Reduced flood risks for 8,819 IDPs across 12 sites in Al-Maafer, Al-Shamaytain, and Al-Mukha.
- Formed 9 flood committees and conducted risk assessments in 6 sites, protecting 4,008 individuals.
- Infrastructure upgrades benefited 2,680 residents and improved safety for 2,225.

#### Shelter/NFI Interventions:

- Provided 400 emergency shelters to 7,287 flood-affected people.
- Distributed 416 NFI kits and 400 shelter kits in Al-Mukha, Al-Ta'iziyah, and Mawza.
- Delivered 400 shelter repair kits in four districts and 300 sandbags to high-risk IDP households in Al-Ta'iziyah.
- These interventions significantly strengthened resilience, improved WASH access, and reduced climate-related disaster impacts.

### **PROJECT OBJECTIVES**

To enhance the preparedness for and mitigate the impact of flooding by the provision of multi-sectoral Shelter/NFI, WASH, and CCCM emergency flood-response preparedness activities for IDPs and vulnerable host communities in high-risk areas in Taiz Governorate.

#### PROJECT OUTPUTS

#### **WASH Output:**

Flood-affected communities regained access to safe drinking water, improved sanitation, and increased flood resilience.

#### **CCCM Output 1:**

Nine flood committees were formed in 9 sites. Risk assessments were conducted in 3 IDP sites in Al-Makha, and awareness sessions on flood risks were held in 6 sites across Al-Maafer (5 sites), Al-Makha (3 sites), and Ash Shamayatayn (2 sites).

#### CCCM Output 2:

Site maintenance and mitigation took place in Al-Maafer, Al-Makha, and Ash Shamayatayn, including road repairs in 7 sites, maintenance of 2 drainage systems, backfilling pits in 5 sites, and construction of 4 flood protection gabions.

#### **Shelter Output:**


416 NFI kits, 400 emergency shelter kits, 400 shelter repair kits, and 300 sandbags were prepositioned and distributed across 196 IDP sites in Taiz Governorate.





- 1- CHV Training: 10 Community Health Volunteers (CHVs) will be recruited and trained (5 in Al Mudhaffar, 5 in Salah) on hygiene and protection messages. 2- Hygiene Kits Distribution: 522 hygiene kits will be distributed to the most vulnerable HHs in targeted IDP sites by GWQ's distribution team.
- 3- Monitoring: Regular field monitoring by the Project Manager and MEAL Officer, including FGDs, staff meetings, and beneficiary interviews, to ensure adherence to the work plan and budget.
- 4- Post-Distribution Monitoring: A consulting firm will be contracted to conduct a PDM survey after kit distribution.
- 5- CFM: Functional and accessible Complaint & Feedback Mechanisms (CFM) will be established and communicated to all stakeholders.

- 6- Protection Infrastructure: A contractor will rehabilitate damaged protection walls and construct a new wall around the solar energy system of Al-Suwaiqa Water Project in Al-Shamatin to protect against floods.
- 7-Solar System Repair: GWQ will assess, install, and test a new solar pumping system for the flood-damaged Al-Madhafa project in Al-Shamaytain.
- 8- Flood Preparedness: Waste and debris will be cleared from basins, culverts, and flood channels in Al-Mudaffar, Salah, and surrounding districts to mitigate flood risk.
- 9- Sanitation: A service provider will be hired to empty cesspits/septic tanks in 18 IDP sites (Al Mudhaffar, Al Makha, Salah, Al Ta'aziyah), and to rehabilitate emergency latrines in Mawza.

# **GWQ** contributed

to improving access to safe water for flood-affected populations in Taiz Governorate through the Emergency Support and Life-Saving Assistance Project. Interventions included the rehabilitation of damaged water projects, installation of solar-powered pumping systems, implementation of hygiene promotion campaigns, and distribution of hygiene kits to the most vulnerable households. These efforts helped strengthen community resilience, reduce the risk of waterborne diseases, and improve living conditions in the targeted areas.

# **PROJECT SUMMARY**

Yemen is suffering from a crippling humanitarian crisis, and the food crisis is one of the biggest challenges it faces. According to a report by UNICEF, 17.4 million people in Yemen are malnourished, constituting 58% of the country's population. In addition, the situation is expected to be exacerbated by a 20% reduction in humanitarian food assistance and the expected increase in food prices.

Emergency food assistance is an essential part of the international community's efforts to alleviate the crisis.



# PROJECT SUMMARY

By targeting the most vulnerable households returning to the Salah, Al-Mudhaffar, and Al-Qahira districts, the project aims to provide meaningful and sustainable economic support that will enhance their resilience and contribute to the broader recovery and development of the community.

The primary beneficiaries of this project are 35 vulnerable households returning to the Salah, Al-Mudhaffar, and Al-Qahira districts in Taiz City. These households have been identified as some of the most affected by the ongoing conflict and displacement. They often face significant economic hardships, limited access to basic services, and disrupted social networks.

# **PROJECT OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Conduct a comprehensive assessment to identify and select the most vulnerable households in the target districts.
- 2. Build the capacity of selected households through training in economic feasibility and business planning.
- 3. Provide financial and material support to implement sustainable economic projects.
- 4. Ensure continuous monitoring and support to enhance the sustainability and success of the economic projects.



- 5- Form flood committees per site, conduct awareness on high-risk living, and develop site-specific emergency flood response plans including MRE messaging and civil documentation/HLP referrals.

- 6- Conduct rapid multi-sector assessments and shelter mapping in 6 high flood-risk IDP sites using developed tools and community consultation to prioritize urgent interventions and mitigation plans.
- 7- Through CFW, provide tools/items for IDP households in 2 Al Maafer sites to maintain/build drainage channels, level roads, clear ditches, soil embankments, desludge drainage, and maintain sewage including backfilling pits/swamps.
- 8- Through CFW, provide tools/items to build flood protection walls/gabions in 4 sites across Al Maafer and Al Mukha districts (indicator
- 9- Via CFW, provide tools/items and hire unskilled/semi-skilled workers (\$7/day or \$105/month) to repair roads, drainage, and fill pits/swamps for IDP site access; contract a professional company for road paving and employ 3 field engineers for supervision.

# **GWQ** contributed

to improving site management and community resilience for flood-affected populations in Taiz Governorate through the Emergency Support and Life-Saving Assistance Project. Interventions included establishing flood committees for each site, conducting flood risk assessments, setting up community alert systems, and raising awareness on protection risks and emergency preparedness. These efforts enhanced coordination, improved living conditions, and strengthened the capacity of communities to respond to flood-related emergencies in the targeted areas.








# 01 SHELTER ACTIVITIES

- 1- GWQ will identify flood-affected IDP households through assessments and partner referrals.
- 2- Register affected IDP households in distribution lists by site, district, and vulnerability.
- 3- Purchase 400 emergency shelter kits (ESKs) per Yemen Shelter Cluster standards.
- 4- Purchase 400 shelter repair kits, stored in two warehouses in At Ta'ziyah and AlMakha (200 each).
- 5- Conduct post-distribution monitoring (PDM) via a consulting firm for NFI kits.
- 6- Project staff will perform regular monitoring visits including focus groups and interviews to ensure activity implementation per plan and budget.
- 7- Establish and maintain functional complaint and feedback mechanisms, communicated to beneficiaries and stakeholders.
- 8- Conduct a one-day GBV & PSEA kickoff workshop for 15 staff members.
- 9- Purchase 416 NFI kits stored in AlMakha and At Ta'ziyah warehouses.
- 10- Purchase 300 sandbags following Shelter Cluster standards, stored in At Ta'ziyah warehouse.
- 11- Rent 4 sub-distribution points (2 in Al Maafer, 2 in Al Muddaffar) to facilitate SNFI distribution from main warehouses.
