Introduction

Yemen remains one of the largest humanitarian crises in the world, with around 23.4 million people in need of assistance, including almost 13 million children.

After eight years of conflict, the national socioeconomic systems of Yemen remain on the edge of total collapse, while conflict, large-scale displacement and recurring climate shocks have left families vulnerable to communicable diseases outbreaks. By late 2022, more than 17.8 million people, including 9.2 million children, lacked access to safe water, sanitation and hygiene services. The country continues to experience regular outbreaks of cholera, measles, diphtheria and other vaccine-preventable diseases.

The country's economy has been shattered. Countless homes, warehouses, farms and vital parts of civilian infrastructure have been destroyed. The flow of food – nearly ⁹⁰ percent of which had to be imported even before the conflict started - has been massively disrupted by the warring parties. Prices are continuing to rise, while many of the poorest people have lost their incomes.

More than half of Yemenis do not have enough to eat. $^{7.4}$ million people - 25 percent of the population - suffer from malnutrition, including 2 million children.








- 2 •Rehabilitation of the sewage network in the Al-Muzaffar District (Al-Dar neighborhood - to Al-Thalatheen Street).
- 3 •Providing equipment, means of transportation, hygiene tools, and straw covers to deal with sewage overflow in Al-Qahira District.



The project will be implemented in Aden Governorate in eight directorates (Al-Buraigah, Al-Mansoura, Al-Mualla, Sheikh Othman, Al-Tawahi, Crater, Dar Saad). 



Project summary

The WASH interventions and activities for eleven months -are designed and tailored to be in line with the 2022 3rd YHF Reserve Allocation CCCM sector objective of To ensure continuity of WASH services and mitigate /address potential protection risks of the most vulnerable people in targeted locations through integrated response of comprehensive WASH services, ensuring WASH activities are according to the assessed need and to ensure durability WASH cluster strategic objective 2 of Deliver life-saving WASH assistance to reduce acute needs and protection risks to displaced women, girls, boys, and men affected by conflict and natural disaster WASH cluster strategic objective 3 of Sustain and restore inclusive WASH services by improving existing WASH systems in areas of acute needs and high risk of disease outbreak and nutrition concern and 2023 HNO and 2022 HRP objectives.



- Repair, rehabilitate, augment, or maintain water supply and sanitation systems: Rehabilitation of 4 water schemes/wells in Al Wazi'iyah and Mawza districts.

Project objectives

To ensure continuity of service coordination, improved quality of monitoring, and Accountability to 280 IDP households/affected People in three hosting sites of Buhairi, Al Mulwa, and Jasr Resian in Mawza district and assessing and supporting building blocks to durable solutions for six months and to ensure continuity of WASH services and mitigate /address potential protection risks of the most vulnerable people of 2350 HHs (2237 HHs from the host community and 113 IDP HHs) in Al-Wazi'iyah and 2311 HHs (2079 HHs from the host community and 232IDP HHs) in Mawza district in Taiz Governorate through improving/rehabilitating the existing water systems, constructions of family latrines, distribution of hygiene and sanitation kits, conducting hygiene promotion sessions and solid wastemanagement for eleven months.

Project Activities

- 1 Establishe community committees women in 3 IDP hosting sites.
- Trained the community committees.
- Targeted IDP sites on-site self-management and coordination, GBV, and CFM.
- 4 Trained volunteers and one supervisor on monitoring of population movements and multi-sector monitoring assessments (CCCM).
- Trained NGOs partners and local authorities on site management and coordination, protection, and GBV to ensure effective and integrated assistance for IDPs living in hosting sites and raise their awareness on protection and GBV.
- 6 Monthly meetings with the community committees to discuss the sites issues, gaps/needs, challenges, and required/needed services/interventions in the targeted IDP sites.

- Monitoring population movement, including registration of the new IDP arrivals and updating the sites population data in 3 IDP hosting sites.
- 8 Mapping and multi-cluster needs assessment in 3 IDP hosting sites by using CCCM cluster reporting tools.
- Monthly coordination meetings with INGOs/NGO partners, local authorities, executive unit, and IDPs representatives during to discuss the issues, challenges, gaps, needs of the targeted IDP sites and sharing the updates of the IDPs hosting sites.
- Distributed 3 complaint boxes in the 3 IDP hosting sites.
- Distributed 280 rainy kits for 280 IDPs HHs (Al Buhairi, Al Mulwa and Jasr Resian) in Mawza district.
- Installation two water tanks in two IDP sites Al Buhairi, and Jasr Resian, and filled them with water to fight fires and reduce any fire risks in the site.
- 13 Rehabilitate two water supply schemes in Al-Wazi'iyah -district.
- Rehabilitate two water supply schemes in Mawza district.
- Two microbiological tests for the water in the four targeted wells intended.
- Distribute 2350 basic hygiene kits for 2350 HHs in Al-Wazi'iyah and 250 basic hygiene kits for 250 HHs in Mawza.
- Distribute 200 sanitation kits in Al-Wazi'iyah and 62 sanitation kits in Mawza.
- Hygiene promotion awareness sessions in Al-Wazi'iyah and Mawza districts.
- Construct 200 family latrines with solar energy for lightening in Al-Wazi'iyah.
- Solid waste collection and disposal in Mawza.

3006 families (2856HHs from the host community and 150 HHs from IDPs in hosting sites) (Men 3885, Women 2096, Boys 5236, and Girls 4854) in Al- Wazaiiyah, and 2051 HHs from the host community (Men 2814, Women 2929, Boys 4221, and Girls 4393) access to safe and clean water through rehabilitation of 4 wells in Wazi'iyah and Mawza districts (Al-Khaim and Al-Hawak in Al Wazi'iyah district and Al-Dhwayha and Al Haad in Mawza district) and installed of 4 fiber water collective tanks in Al Wazi'iyah, constructed of one concrete collective water tank in Mawza, water treatment, and water quality surveillance before and after rehabilitated. Also distributed of 810 water filters for the most vulnerable families to improve and treatment the quality and purity of water. Moreover, formed and trained 4 water management committees with 21 members (19 Men and 2 Women) in four wells (Al-Khaim and Al-Hawak As Sufla in Al-Wazi'iyah district and Al Dhuwayha and Al Had in Mawza district).



GWQ targeted 200 HHs with 1140 individuals (242 Men 252 Women 342 Boys 304 Girls) from the most vulnerable families from the host community by 200 family latrines supported with solar energy, and sanitation kits in two sub-districts (Al Dharifah and As Suwayda) Wazayaah district to helping the families reduce the spread of diseases in the district, and instilled 62 emergency latrines into 3 IDP hosting sites (10 emergency latrines in AlAsforey IDP site, 45 emergency latrines in Al- Majash Al Asfal IDP site, and 7 in Al-Buhairi IDP site) supported with solar energy and sanitation kits to promote the protection and dignity of families in IDP hosting sites. In addition, implemented four cleaning campaigns to remove all the garbage and solid waste from the district center, and supported the Cleaning Fund in the district by cleaning materials to continue implementing cleaning campaigns in the district.





GWQ conducted 2600 hygiene promotion awareness session by 14 volunteers (5 Men and 9 Women) in Al-Wazi'iyah and Mawza districts. The awareness sessions were from house to house and targeted 2600 families in both districts from the host community and IDPs (2350 families in Al-Wazi'iyah and 250 families) with 14304 individuals (Men 3156 Women 3396 Boys 4028 Girls 3724) The awareness objectives:

- Establishing healthy behavior and changing wrong healthy behavior in order to improve the quality of life for the individual and society.
- Spreading sound health concepts and knowledge.
- Mitigating the spread diseases inside the targeted areas.
- Raising awareness and the degree of self-control of diseases in the targeted sub-districts.
- Conducting hygiene promotion/community mobilization in areas with high SAM prevalence in the targeted districts.
- Distributing IEC materials.
- Contributing to waste disposal mobilization activity. And supported the targeted families from the hygiene promotion awareness in both districts Al-Wazi'iyah and Mawza by 2600 basic hygiene. In addition distributed 262 sanitation kits to the 200 family latrines, and 62 emergency latrines in Al-Wazi'iyah and Mawza to enhance the hygiene behavior for the host community and displacement people.



Three targeted IDP sites (Buhairi, Al Mulwa, and Jasr Resian) have a Complaint mechanism (complaints boxes with banners, a hotline, Email, suggestions, and complaint forms), and installed in an accessible place for all categories. Furthermore, all community committee members have been trained on receiving, reporting feedback and complaints to the CFM responsible for the SMC project, and all the complaints received have been answered.



GWQ's 6 volunteers with supervisor conducted monthly monitoring population, registering of the new IDP arrivals, sites mapping, and multi-cluster needs assessment by using KOBO and sending the sites' information/data to REACH Yemen and CCCM cluster to get monthly site-level factsheets. These site-level factsheets that show the gaps and needs in the IDP sites are shared with humanitarian actors to facilitate intervention and cover the gaps.


GWQ implemented site maintenance activities in three targeted IDP sites Al Buhairi, Al Mulwa, and Jasr Resian as follows:

- Distributing 280 Rainy kits for 280 HHs in 3 IDP sites (Al Buhairi, Al Mulwa, and Jasr Resian) to help the IDPs protect their documents from being exposed to rain leaks, and help them store their food in a safe way.
- Doing maintenance and installation for fourteen fire extinguishers in the three targeted IDP sites.
- Installing 2 water tanks to fight fire in two IDP sites Al Buhairi, and Jasr Resian, and filling them with water to fight fires and reduce any fire risk in the sites.

Distributing and installing 53 fire extinguishing ball (the ball weighs1.47 kg) for all the IDP families in Al-Mulwa site (53 HHs) to help them to fight fire if any emergency occurred. Three IDP sites have three community committees consisting of 18 members (12 men and 6 Women). Each community committee was divided into 6 sectors such as (Shelter, Food, Wash, Education, health and nutrition, and protection) and each person was responsible for the needs of the sector he was given. The community committee members have been trained on site self-management and coordination, GBV, CFM, and coordination with I/NGOs and stakeholders. In addition, the members of committees had monthly meetings to discuss the issues and needs of IDPs living in the sites and raise that to SMC team to coordinate with partners to provide the services.

Project summary

- 1. Yemen is suffering from a crippling humanitarian crisis, and the food crisis is one of the biggest challenges it faces. According to a report by UNICEF, 17.4 million people in Yemen are malnourished, constituting 58% of the country's population. In addition, the situation is expected to be exacerbated by a 20% reduction in humanitarian food assistance and the expected increase in food prices.
- 2. Emergency food assistance is an essential part of the international community's efforts to alleviate the crisis.

 81 Vulnerable, displaced, and conflict-affected households are able to meet their basic food needs through food vouchers.



- The project aims to have a greater influence of Yemeni women in peace building and decision-making for the stability of local communities and long-term prospects for peace in Yemen, By strengthening the capacities and knowledge of women and young women and local authorities in community participation and community resilience, in addition to the role of women and youth in humanitarian response and peacebuilding.

Project summary

The project aimed to enhance flood preparedness and mitigate the impacts of floods on vulnerable populations across seven districts in Taiz Governorate through multi-sectoral interventions in WASH, Shelter/NFI, and CCCM. It successfully provided life-saving services to over 154,880 individuals across eight districts, restoring safe drinking water, improving hygiene practices, and enhancing sanitation. Community resilience was bolstered through the establishment of flood committees, risk assessments, and infrastructure improvements. Additionally, emergency shelter and non-food item kits were distributed to 1,500 displaced families, significantly reducing the adverse effects of climate change and natural disasters in the region.

WASH Interventions:

- 1. Provided life-saving water, sanitation, and hygiene services to 9,305 IDP and 10,708 host community households (139,579 individuals) across eight districts: Al Mukha, Al Ta'zi'iyah, Al Misrakh, Maqbanah, Al Mudaffar, Salah, Mawza, and Shamaytain.
- 2. Restored safe drinking water access for 5,877 individuals in Al-Madhaf area and protected water infrastructure for 8,852 individuals in Al-Suwaiqa area, both in Al-Shamaytain district.
- 3. Improved hygiene practices for 31,201 individuals through 123 hygiene promotion sessions, distribution of 1,250 IEC materials, and 67 clean-up campaigns in 16 IDP sites in Al-Mudhaffar and Salah.
- 4. Mitigated flood risks for 62,000 individuals by removing 1,327m³ of waste from drainage canals and opening flood channels in Al-Mudhaffar and Salah.







Enhanced sanitation for 4,186 households by removing 1,133m³ of sludge from 916 latrines and maintaining 30 emergency latrines in multiple districts.

Distributed hygiene kits to 522 households, benefiting 3,149 individuals in IDP sites in Al-Misrakh, Maqbana, and Al-Mukha. CCCM Interventions:

Improved safety and reduced flood risks for 8,819 displaced people across 12 sites in Al-Maafer, Al-Shamatin, and Al-Mukha districts.

Established nine flood committees and conducted detailed risk assessments in six sites, protecting over 4,008 individuals.

Improved infrastructure, including road enhancements and flood prevention measures, directly benefiting 2,680 residents and ensuring safer living conditions for 2,225 residents.

Shelter Interventions:

Provided 400 emergency shelter to 7,287 flood-affected people. Distributed 416 non-food item kits and 400 emergency shelter kits to displaced families in Al-Mokha, Al-Ta'iziya, and Mawza districts.

Provided 400 shelter repair kits to IDP families with damaged shelters in Al Mokha, Al Ta'iziyah, Mawza, and Al Maafer districts. Distributed 300 sandbags to 300 IDP households in high-risk sites in the Al-Ta'aziyah District.

These efforts have significantly improved access to water, hygiene, and flood resilience, while reducing the adverse effects of natural disasters in the affected areas.







Project objectives

To enhance the preparedness for and mitigate the impact of flooding by the provision of multi-sectoral Shelter/NFI, WASH, and CCCM emergency flood-response preparedness activities for IDPs and vulnerable host communities in high-risk areas in Taiz Governorate.

Project implementation places



Project Activities



WASH Sector:

- 1- Cleaning campaigns, and hygiene awareness campaigns.
- 2- Purchase and distribute 522 basic hygiene kits to the most vulnerable HHs.
- 3- Conduct regular monitoring visits.
- 4- Establish/maintain functional and accessible complaints and feedback mechanisms.
- 5- Rehabilitation of existing protection walls that suffer from cracks and gaps, and construction of a new protection wall around the solar energy system for the Suwaiqa Water Project in Al-Shamatin District.
- 6- Repair of the solar pumping system for the Al-Madafa project in Al-Shamayateen Directorate, and evaluation, installation, and testing of the new pumping system.
- 7- Lifting and removing waste, including dirt, stones, and various garbage, from sedimentation basins, liquids, sewage channels, and flood channels, as a preparedness measure to reduce flooding in Al-Muzaffar, Salah, and Al-Manatiq.
- 8- Appoint a service provider to maintain and empty filled septic and septic tanks in 18 IDP sites and rehabilitate emergency latrines in flood-affected IDP sites.





CCCM Sector:

1- Recruitment of project staff and volunteers,

Coordinate with the local authorities and obtain project implementation permits from MoPIC, the Labor and Social Affairs office, and the executive unit.

- 2- Establish community alert systems at the site/area level, effective communication, awareness-raising, and information dissemination methods on protection risks and mitigation measures, and clear channels for feedback.
- 3- Conduct regular monitoring visits.
- 4- Establish complaints and feedback and complaint mechanisms.
- 5- Establishing a flood committee per managed site, awareness sessions on the risks of living in high-risk locations, and developing a site-specific emergency flood response plan. That includes MRE (mine risk education) messaging and civil documentation (and HLP) referrals.
- 6- Carrying out rapid multi-sectoral assessments, and identification/mapping of shelters at flood risk.
- 7- Procurement and provision of tools/materials for IDP families in two IDP sites.
- 8- Purchase and provide tools/materials to build flood protection walls/fences for four sites.
- 9- Procure and provide tools/materials for road rehabilitation to enable access to IDP sites as well as drainage, and filling of potholes and swamps.





Shelter Sector:

- 1- Identifying vulnerable, flood-affected, and needy displaced households through assessments conducted by the team and referrals.
- 2- Registration of affected IDP HHs in the distribution list.
- 3- Procurement of 400 emergency shelter kits according to the standards and guidelines of the shelter kit in Yemen.
- 4-Procurement of 400 shelter repair kits according to the standards and guidelines of the Yemen Shelter Cluster.
- 5- Conduct post-distribution monitoring and analysis through a consulting firm that will conduct post-distribution monitoring of the following: Post-distribution monitoring after the distribution of NFI kits.
- 6- Conduct regular monitoring visits.
- 7- Establish/maintain functional and accessible complaints and feedback mechanisms.
- 8- Conducting a one-day training workshop for 15 of its staff on gender-based violence, exploitation, and sexual abuse.
- 9- The Ministry of Public Works and Roads has purchased 416 sets of non-food items which will be stored in the two main warehouses in Al Mukha and At Taizah districts. About topic 1.1.1 (Shelter)
- 10- Purchase of 300 sandbags according to the standards and guidelines of the Yemeni Shelter Cluster.
- 11- Rent 4 distribution points/sub-warehouses.

WASH Output:Flood-affected communities have restored access to safe drinking water, improved sanitation, and enhanced flood resilience.




CCCM Output 2: Site maintenance and mitigation activities have been carried out across Al Maafer ,AlMakha and Ash Shamayatayn districts in Taiz Governorate; including repairing roads in seven sites, maintaining two drainage systems in flood -affected areas,backfilling pits and swamps of five of the damaged site facilities and assets after flood, and constructing four flood protection gabions.
